Rationale

- Embed Aboriginal community engagement into the culture of the school

Engagements with first peoples and a deeper understanding creates benefit for both Indigenous and non-Indigenous people alike. Connections based on trust and reciprocity are key to improving the health and wellbeing of Indigenous – relationship building is core to improving the health and well-being of all people. However, meaningful relationships do not develop overnight, we must develop trust and authentic connection as a first step. This takes time and commitment from any non-Indigenous organisation.

As the guiding principle of Life Again and our work with first peoples - 'No Change Without Understanding' indicates, national policy objectives in Indigenous affairs, including Reconciliation, will not be achieved by the Australian government alone. Instead, achievement of these objectives must start with work at the grass-roots level between Indigenous and non-Indigenous community-based organisations and education institutions.

Who is Life Again?

Founded in 2012, Life Again is a not-for-profit social enterprise and DGR registered charitable foundation. Our focus is on prevention and positive mental health outcomes for both Indigenous and non- Indigenous people through cultural education initiatives and innovative preventative and positive mental health programs.

As a non-Indigenous organisation committed to fulfilling our vision of a psychologically and culturally thriving Australia, we believe that national policy objectives in Indigenous affairs, including Reconciliation and Closing the Gap, will not be achieved by the Australian government alone. Rather, it requires and indeed must start, with meaningful and authentic engagement at grass-roots level between Indigenous and non-Indigenous organisations.

We are guided by the principle '**No Change Without Understanding**'. If we want to affect change – we must seek to understand first and foremost, and to do this we must come into a meaningful and authentic relationship with ourselves and others.
